











Bay Area average annual maximum temperature increased by 1.7°F (0.95 °C) from 1950 to 2005 (CA 4th Assessment Report)


Precipitation (Observed)


Factors that enhance vulnerability to these hazards


Who are the people most likely to be adversely impacted during disaster and climate change processes?

- Individual Characteristics
 - Age-related sensitivity (the very old and very young)
 - Physical or Mental Disability
 - Pre-existing conditions that predisposes toward high impacts from stressors (e.g., asthma and smoke exposure)
- Economic Capacity
- Systematic Oppression and Exclusion from Adaptation, Preparation, and Recovery Resources
- Livelihood-based Factors (e.g., both income source and home are affected by wildfire)
- Technological Access
- Other Factors

Index of indicators known to result in disproportionate negative impacts following disaster events








A Trending Increase in Wildfire Risk









What is a transportation vulnerability?


Conditions that may impede people's movement during a climate emergency, considered from 2 perspectives:

Russian River set to flood as storm leads to heavy runoff in Sonoma County










Sufficient time to prepare for evacuation like 2017 fires


Future inability to drive

Not for myself but for our neighbor that has MS, during Kincade we had very limited space between her animals and ours and the people









Which of the following have you done to prepare yourself or your family to evacuate in an emergency (check all that apply):
















Briefly, share what aspirations or goals you have for Windsor?
